Confirmation

Position in the educational system

The course is given as a freestanding course at second cycle level.

Entry requirements

For admission to the course, 90 credits in English as the main field of study are required including an individual assignment of 15 credits, or the equivalent foreign education. In addition, passed proficiency results from either advanced course in English, or IELTS 7.5 or TOEFL 625, are required.

Learning outcomes

On successful completion of the course the student is expected to be able to:

Knowledge and understanding

- describe important literature theory related problems and specialisations;

- describe a specific literary-historical field;

Skills and abilities

- systematically integrate knowledge of different literary theory-related problems and specialisations;

- do close readings and discuss texts showing an advanced critical, analytical and stylistic ability;

Judgement and approach

- orally and in writing analyse, evaluate, and critically review his/her own literary arguments and studies and those of others on the basis of their scientific and ethical possibilities, limitations and consequences for the surrounding society and for continued studies in the area.

Course content

The course consists of the following two modules:

Module 1:

Advanced literary theory, 7.5 credits (Advanced literary theory, 7.5 Higher Education Credits)

The course explores a selection of current theoretical problems and specialisations, with emphasis on the study of literary theory-related primary texts.

Module 2:

Special thesis preparation course, 7.5 credits (Specializing course preparing for degree project, 7.5 Higher Education Credits)

The student chooses a clearly delimited field of English-speaking literature and compiles the reading list in consultation with examiner. The focus should be on literary texts, but also literary criticism and other secondary literature should be included. The specialisation of the course can ideally form the basis of the work with the Master's (60 or 120 credits) dissertation.

Form of teaching

The teaching is conducted in the form of seminars.

Language of instruction: English

Assessment

All learning objectives are examined in writing in the form of submissions. Students are also examined orally in the form of an oral presentation.

If a student who has failed the same examined component twice, wishes to change examiner before the next examination, a written application should be sent to the department responsible for the course and be granted unless there are special reasons to the contrary (Chapter 6, Section 22 of Higher Education Ordinance).

In cases where a course has been discontinued or has undergone major changes, the student should normally be guaranteed at least three examination occasions (including the ordinary examination) during a period of at least one year from the last time the course was given.

Grades

The grading scale comprises: Pass with Distinction (VG), Pass (G) and Fail (U). The requirement for a Pass with distinction on the whole course is the grade Pass with distinction on at least 50% of the total credits on the course, i.e. 7.5 credits.

Course evaluation

The students are given the opportunity to make a written evaluation of the course. The results of the evaluation are published digitally.

Additional information

Equality aspects should be taken into account in content, literature, teaching and evaluation. In addition, the course should make students aware of and problematise
