Learning outcomes

After completion of the course the student is expected to be able to:

Knowledge and understanding

- describe the significant traits and chronology of the Swedish welfare state
- describe the joint influence of the social, economic and political forces that led to the formation of the Swedish welfare state

Skills and abilities

• discuss and problematize the Swedish welfare state in an international perspective

• discuss and problematize different interpretations of the welfare state as historical phenomena

Critical thinking and approach

• analyse the welfare state from an ideological and political perspective including class and gender aspects in the analysis

Course content

The course gives an overview over the history of the Swedish welfare state. The course discusses the character of the Swedish welfare state as well as its historical and ideological roots. Significant social, economic and political developments during the 20th century will be dealt with. Some international comparisons will be done.

The course is divided into two different parts

- 1) The formation of the Swedish welfare state, 7.5 HEC
- 2) The character and transformation of the Swedish welfare state, 7.5 HEC

Form of teaching

Language of instruction: English

Assessment

Exams are administered through individual written exams.

A student who has failed the exam twice has the right to change examiner. In such case a written application should be sent in to the Department. The total number of examination occasions is limited to five.

In cases where a course has been discontinued or major changes have been made a student should be guaranteed at least three examination occasions (including the ordinary examination occasion) during a time of at least one year from the last time the course was given.

Grades

The grading scale comprises: Fail (U), Pass (G), Pass with Distinction (VG). Students included in the ERASMUS program have the right to grading according to the ECTS scales.
