#### **Course content**

The aim of the course is to give basic knowledge of the emergence of the modern economics. The course takes its starting point in the industrialisation processes of the 19th century and follows the economic development both global and in Sweden, up to the beginning of the 21st century. The literature of the course and lectures give a general image of the historical development from an economic perspective, while historical processes are problematised in relation to key concepts as departments living standard, resource allocation and sustainable development. The student may train in seminars in to analyse long-term historical processes such as the relationship between population trend, agricultural change and industrial transformation.

#### Form of teaching

The teaching consists of lectures and seminars, where the students work with written assignments that are discussed on assessing seminars.

Language of instruction: Swedish and English

#### **Assessment**

All intended learning outcomes are assessed through compulsory seminars with associated written individual written assignments and written examinations. The student who does not participates at compulsory seminars must make written supplementary assignments in mandatory time to pass the course.

A student who has failed the same examination twice by the same examiner has the right

to change the examiner. The student shall submit a written request to the Department. The request shall be granted unless there are special reasons to the contrary (Chapter 6, Section 22 of Higher Education Ordinance).

A student with a recommendation for special educational support from the University of Gothenburg may receive an adapted examination or alternative examination form provided that the examiner decides it is compatible with the course objectives and it does not require unreasonable resources.

In the case where a course has been discontinued or has undergone major changes, a student shall be guaranteed access to at least three examination sessions (including the regular examination session) during a period of at least one year, but at the most two years after the course has been discontinued/changed. The same applies for internships and on-the-job trainings, but with a restriction to only one additional examination session.

#### **Grades**

The grading scale comprises: Excellent (A), Very good (B), Good (C), Satisfactory (D), Sufficient (E) and Fail (F).

To receive a Pass grade (A-E) in the course, passed results in all assessing components are required.
