Knowledge and understanding

- · Understand and discuss twenty-first century TV in depth
- · Compare and contrast different theoretical approaches to twenty-first-century TV

Course content

What is television in the twenty-first century? In digitally networked cultures television is being transformed as we see the emergence of more fragmented audiences and niche programs. Simultaneously, the cultural status of television is rapidly changing as the notions of prestige and quality reenter the critical lexicon applied to television programs and genres.

This module considers television as a paradigmatic form of twenty-first-century cultures. We will come to terms with the television's current post-network era against the background of the history of broadcasting and the emergence of television networks. In particular, we will examine the recent developments of so-called quality television programs, reality-television shows, reality competition as well as para-televisual forms of programming such as the web series and vlogs. Particular attention will be paid to economic, aesthetic, and technological factors in the rise of multi-season serial formats, new types of narrative complexity, and modified realisms (aesthetic, psychological, reality television, etc.) shaping character construction.

Assessment

If a student, who has failed the same examined element on two occasions, wishes to change examiner before the next examination session, such a request is to be submitted to the department in writing and granted unless there are special reasons to the contrary (Chapter 6, Section 22 of Higher Education Ordinance).
